

**EMERGENCY CRITICAL CARE MEDICINE
ATTENDING PHYSICIAN - NOCTURNISTS**

The Department of Emergency Medicine at Brigham and Women's Hospital (BWH) and Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH) is seeking a nocturnists Emergency Critical Care Medicine (ECCM) attending physician to support the ICUs at both major academic medical centers and their affiliated community hospitals (50-50 split). The position will support critical care 100%. This is a joint recruitment of the MassGeneral Brigham Division of Emergency Critical Care Medicine and the Brigham and Women's Hospital Department of Surgery, Division of Critical Care Medicine. BWH (790 beds) and MGH (1000 beds) are academic teaching hospitals of Harvard Medical School. The Division of Emergency Critical Care Medicine also supports a growing fellowship program.

The successful candidate will have completed a residency in Emergency Medicine and a fellowship in Critical Care and is Board Eligible/Board Certified in Emergency Medicine and Critical Care. Experience and/or ability to work within an integrated health system and easily transition between academic teaching and community practices is preferred.

This position is eligible for an academic appointment at Harvard Medical School at the rank of Instructor part-time, Assistant part-time or Associate Professor part-time, commensurate with experience, achievement, recognition, and teaching. The position also offers opportunities for professional development, a competitive salary, and an outstanding comprehensive benefit package.
