

Full-Time Health Service Psychologist

The Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences in collaboration with the Division of General Pediatrics at Boston Children's Hospital, is seeking a full-time, health service psychologist to expand clinical services and conduct scholarly research in the Robert's Program on Sudden Unexpected Death. This psychologist will 1) help develop and implement an acute counseling response to caregivers/families whose children have died suddenly and unexpectedly, largely due to the sudden infant death syndrome; 2) participate in primary research in prolonged grief disorder and attachment, with an expectation of assuming leadership in a family-centered research program addressing adaptation to loss; and 3) oversee efforts to measure outcomes of risk factors for grief and program interventions. Formal training and prior experience in working with loss and its impact on family systems, particularly with adults, is preferred. Robert's Program will provide four years of funding without expectations for clinical revenues or grant support to foster the development of expertise and a research program for this position. This position requires a Massachusetts health service provider license in psychology. Appointment at Harvard Medical School as Instructor, Assistant Professor, or Associate Professor will be commensurate with experience and will require ongoing teaching. Completion of APA/CPA-approved doctoral programs and internships required.
