

BRIGHAM AND WOMEN'S HOSPITAL ACADEMIC HEMATOPATHOLOGIST

The Department of Pathology of the Brigham and Women's Hospital (BWH), a principal teaching affiliate of Harvard Medical School, is seeking an academically oriented, board certified/board eligible Hematopathologist, with appropriate training and established diagnostic skills. The successful applicant's clinical duties will be divided between the Hematopathology Service, based in the Anatomic Pathology Division, and the Hematology Laboratory, based in the Clinical Laboratories Division. Responsibilities will include interpretation of bone marrow aspirates and biopsies, lymph nodes, peripheral blood, flow cytometry, and tissue immuno-histochemistry specimens, general laboratory hematology, as well as fellow, resident, and medical student teaching. The Department is staffed by more than 100 faculty and more than 55 residents and clinical fellows in anatomic and clinical pathology in a predominantly subspecialty-oriented model. The Department collectively handles over 70,000 surgicals and 1,000,000 hematology specimens annually, has a busy Center for Advanced Molecular Diagnostics (which collaborates actively with the Hematopathology Service) and is responsible for provision of pathology services at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, where there is a high volume of hemato-oncology. The environment provides substantial opportunities for clinical and translational research. Applicants should be committed to excellence in patient care, teaching, scholarship, and research. Successful applicants will hold the rank of instructor, assistant professor, or associate professor at Harvard Medical School. Academic rank and salary will be commensurate with experience and accomplishments.
